Holy week and Easter 2020: 'Christian festivals under lockdown'

As I write this message to you, we are coming towards the end of the 'lockdown' brought upon us by the Coronavirus pandemic. Most of us are beginning to get used to the idea that we are only allowed to leave our homes a couple of times a day for shopping, medical visits or for our daily 'exercise'. Some are in complete social isolation and are unable to leave home at all. When we do go outside, we have to exercise something called 'social distancing' which means we're not supposed to get any closer than 2 meters to another person.

What a strange world we have come to inhabit! Most of us are by nature quite gregarious, we like being with other people. Other people's company lift our spirits and make us feel happy to be alive. The thought that we might need to spend the next few weeks if not months on our own or getting on top of our families fills few of us with great joy!

As the virus continues to grow and we know of people who have been infected or even, as in one sad instance this week, people we have known have actually died, so the severity of this global health emergency hits home

to us all. Our heartfelt prayers go out to all who are sick and unwell, all who mourn the loss of loved ones, all who work so tirelessly to look after us – Doctors, nurses, shopworkers, refuse collectors and many more.

How then are we Christians going to celebrate Holy week and Easter this year? These festivals are at the very heart of what it is to be a Christian. We are so used to being together with brothers and sisters in Christ during for example Maundy Thursday foot washing services, Good Friday reflections and marches of witness and those joyful Easter Day services with the beautifully decorated churches with the Lenten crosses decked in flowers. How much we enjoy shouting out those words of joy 'Christ the Lord is risen, he is risen indeed' and singing those hearty Easter hymns like 'Thine be the glory, risen conquering son'!

We have been working hard as a circuit to make sure that we keep in touch with as many people as possible during this 'lock down phase' and to offer as much support as possible. This has included lots of telephone calls, WhatsApp messages and groups, emails and even YouTube services, and good old-fashioned letters with pen and ink! We hope that you have found all of this helpful.

We recognise that Easter is going to be hard this year but maybe the lockdown does have some positives. Traffic on our roads has fallen and pollution levels as well, meaning we can at last breathe fresh air and even see the stars in the sky at night! Being at home also gives us more time to read, to think and to pray. It offers us space to reflect upon our lives in the light of our Christian faith and consider our place in God's world.

Holy week also reminds us of course, that in Jesus we find a God who knows what it is to feel alone and isolated. Remember how he was denied three times by Peter and even betrayed by Judas. He was left alone as he faced Herod and Pontius Pilate as he was spat upon, slandered, whipped and died a painful death on a Roman cross.

His final words, 'Unto your hands O Lord, I commit my spirit' (Luke 23:46) remind us that even death, even in the darkest moment of his life, Jesus

knew that he was not alone. He knew that this was his Father's will and that his Father suffered with him. His Father gave him the strength to do what he knew was right.

As we go through lockdown Holy week, let us too be reminded that we are never alone and that it will be faith that will bring us through this difficult time. We do not know how long this pandemic will last, we do not know how many people will be infected or lose their lives. What we do know is that there will be life after all of this is over.

This reminds us of the greatest hope we have, the hope of the resurrection. Just as Jesus was raised from the tomb three days after his death, so we are reminded that all who have faith in him will be raised to life eternal. This is the joyful message we will continue to proclaim on Easter morning whether we are alone at home, whether we are livestreaming or watching Easter worship on YouTube or TV. Nothing can take away the joy that is Easter. Nothing can defeat the hope that is ours in Jesus Christ.

Christ the Lord is risen. He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

In preparation for the Easter Day service, below is a recipe for a traditional love feast cake adapted from the Middlesmoor Lovefeast Bread used in the Yorkshire Dales at the time of John Wesley

A traditional Love Feast Cake Recipe

Adapted from the Middlesmoor Lovefeast Bread used in the Yorkshire Dales at the time of John Wesley

- 11b (400g) plain flour
- loz (25g) baking powder
- 5oz (125g) butter
- 8oz (200g) sugar
- 2oz (50g) mixed peel
- 4oz (100g) sultanas
- 2 eggs
- About half a pint (280ml) of milk

• Mix the flour and baking powder together, rub in the butter, then add the sugar, sultanas and peel.

- Beat the eggs together with a little milk and add to the dry ingredients.
- Add the rest of the milk to make a soft consistency.

• Pour the mixture into two loaf tins or a large cake tin. Cook at 180° C (350° F) or gas mark 4 for at least 45 minutes for the loaf tins, or 1 hour for the large cake tin.
